
NEW COLUMN BEGINS IN CLARION TODAY

 If I check up on me and you check up on you!


LET'S HAVE A GOOD NEW YEAR!!!!

**BRONCS WIN 4
AND LOSE 1**

COLES 30-CATLETTSBURG 24

Coach Paul Thompson's Broncos made it victory number 3 by defeating Catlettsburg 30-24 December 18 at Coles. The Blue and White led at all the quarter marks with George Brown hitting for 8 points, and Jim Leighow with 7. Sid Remmley took high scoring honors for Catlettsburg, sinking 7 points.

CATLETTSBURG 48 - COLES 45

In their second game against Catlettsburg, which was played January 9 at Catlettsburg, Coles' "A" team suffered their first set-back of the year by a score of 48-45. The Broncos were behind the entire game but came within 3 points of their opponents at the end of the third quarter. George Rupert was high scorer for Coles with 15 followed closely by Vernon Conley who sank 14. Carroll netted 19 for Catlettsburg.

COLES 49 - ADVANCE-15


The Broncs easily defeated Advance 49-15, January 12 at Coles before a large crowd. Coles led at all quarter marks: 10-4, 20-7, 32-12, and 49-15. Don Wellman and Gary McPeek led the Broncos' scoring with 10 and 8 points respectively. For Advance high man was Bailey who sank 7 points.

BRONCOS-57 KENOVA-24

The Coles Broncos, holding a 5-2 record, found little difficulty in smothering Kenova 57-24, January 13 at Kenova. High scorer of the game was Kenova's I. McGlone with 13, Charles Wellman was high point man for Coles with 10.

COLES-41 WURLAND-23

Wurland bowed (41-23) to Coach Thompson's fighting Broncos, January 15 at Wurland. The game was tied at the end of the first quarter but Coles pulled ahead in the second and third quarters to go on to their sixth win. George Rupert was high scorer for Coles with 17.



**BUCCANEERS
DEFEAT COLES**

(61-52)

The Buccaneers of Putnam pulled ahead in the closing minutes of the third quarter to defeat the Coles Broncos 61-52 in their first meeting of the season January 23 at the Ashland High Gym.

The first quarter was evenly matched with Coles on top at the end, 15-14.

In the second quarter, due to the excellent rebounding of George Rupert and Jim Bob Leighow, Coles moved ahead 21-18. This lead was increased 28-17 on fine shooting by Charles Wellman and Vernon Conley. The excellent team play of the Blue and White gained them a 30-22 halftime lead, but the loss of Jim Bob Leighow on fouls in the closing minutes of the first half was a great blow.


At the beginning of the second half, Coles scored several quick baskets. After George Rupert fouled out, the Broncs were left without much height. The substitutes fought well and hard to try to hold the lead, but the height and shooting ability of Putnam's high scorer, Don Griffith, turned the tide for the Buccaneers as they led at the end of the third quarter, 42-38.

In the fourth quarter Coles with almost entirely eighth graders, tied the score 48-48. Putnam, however, went ahead on a foul shot and continued with a scoring spurt to down Coles 61-52 in a hard fought and well played game.


Don Griffith, Putnam's scoring ace, was high man of the evening with 21 points. The high scorer for Coles was Vernon Conley with 11 points.





IN OUR TOWN

Yes, we are really proud of our Home Town, but how much do you know about those assets that make her one of the leading cities of our state?

Did you know that the Ashland Police Force has been recognized three times by the F. B. I. as having the best crime record of any Police Force its size in the United States?

I imagine many of you know very little about our Police Force so I am going to give you some facts about it which were furnished to me by Chief of Police C. F. Howard.

In 1923 the Force contained 12 men while it now has 32. At first there were no police cars so whenever an arrest was made, a taxi was called to bring in the offender, or they would walk him in. Before the city bought cars in 1925, the police had an old Ford roadster which was found unclaimed with "moonshine" in it.

It was also in 1925 that the police station was torn down and the new City Building was built.

The police force now has a 2-way radio system which was bought with contributions from the people and from various business concerns. Before they installed the radio system, the police were summoned to the station by ringing a large bell.

The Ashland Police Force is now very modern and well equipped with four cruisers and a number of motorcycles. You can certainly be very proud of the improvements and the record made by the Ashland Police Force since 1923.


We hear she's keen about sports and boys, so here's your chance, Fellahs!

First there was a scream--then a door opened and slammed shut and a little girl ran out of the room! Crying she threw herself on the floor and yelled, "It's awful! It's awful!"


I suppose you've heard the story a million different ways, but here's the truth.




