
COLES P.T.A. SETS MAR. 28 FOR "CAPERS" DATE



Victory number nine was posted Tuesday, January 29, by the Coles Junior High Broncos, who turned in a 52 to 32 win over Raceland on the loser's home court.

Herbert Thompson sparked Coles' victory with 11 points, while Jim Sparks and Richard Hills posted 9 each. Cox with 14 points was high for Raceland. Coles quarter leads were 12-8, 22-13, and 30-19.

BRONCOS DEFEAT FAIRVIEW 47-26

Coles Junior High's "hoop artists" trounced Fairview, Friday, February 1, 47-26 for their tenth win of the season against two losses.

McPeck with 11 points and Sparks with 10 topped the Coles scoring sheet while Thompson hit 18 for Fairview. Fairview's "B" team defeated the Coles "B" squad 18-17 for their first loss in ten games.

COLES DOWNS CATLETTSBURG 50-24

The Blue and White marked up victory number twelve, February 5, with a 50-24 decision over Catlettsburg here. Coach Thompson's Broncs broke out of a first period tie to lead 23-11 at the half and 40-17 after three periods.

HONOR SOCIETY

Each gift box is to be filled with: toothbrush, small toothpaste, bar of toilet soap, pocket comb, crayons, 3 pencils, eraser, small paper pads, 1 thread, card of buttons, needles, small ball, pair socks, handkerchief, gold safety pins, small doll (if for girl) barrette (if for girl), small car (if for boy), hair ribbon (if for girl).

When you bring your gift or contribute money for this box you are helping in America's good will program toward peoples of other countries.

Builders and Progressives are feeling proud and happy over the success of their "Laff Revue" which has netted the two clubs \$108 to date. (There's still a little money out!)


Today at noon the Coles and Putnam Builders will eat at the Henry Clay Hotel with their sponsors, the Kiwanis Club.




This room is rarely seen or noticed by those who don't take Industrial Arts. It is in the new section of the building next to the gym and bears the number 2.
