# STOP, LOOK, LISTEN



## FINALS IN GIRLS' TOURNEY WEDNESDAY

### PUTNAM DEFEATS COLES 51-45

The Putnam Buccaneers defeated the Coles Broncos 51-45, Friday February 22. This loss snapped a four game winning streak in the inter-city series. Coles tied the score several times but could not overtake Putnam who had a good fourth quarter. Putnam's rebounding was a great highlight in the game. Putnam had a halftime margin of 25-21.

Paul Reliford topped Putnam's scoring sheet with 14, and Larry Highly was a close second with 12. Jim Sparks led Coles scoring with 19 points which was highest for both teams. Bo Newsome sank 10 for second high for the Broncos.

### COLES BEATS ADVANCE 58-26

The Coles Broncos gained their first victory in the Y. M. C. A. Junior High tournament Tuesday, March 26. Coles led the entire game with Advance not even getting near. Leading scorer for the Broncos was George Rupert with 15 and "Put" Thompson with 10. For Advance Wilcox scored 9, and Phelps 7. Coles outscored Advance 8-2 in the first period and led 22-11 at the half.

### BRONCS TROUNCE BOYD CO. 62-35

The Broncos posted victory number 2 Wednesday February 27, defeating Boyd County 62-35. Coles came back with a strong second half after leading 24-16 at the intermission. Talmadge McPeek hit the nets for 20 points and Bush scored 13 for Boyd.

In the Girl s'Gym tournament the third period class has already taken two games.... In the eighth grade tournament, the high scoring third period team defeated the fourth period (Team 2), March 14, in the final game 56-33. Mary Ellen Justice scored 35 points for the victors, and Judy Bocard had 23 points for the losers. In advancing to the final game, the third period team defeated the fourth period (Team 1), March 5, 52-8, while the fourth period (Team 2) defeated second period, March 10, 39-23.

Putnam nosed out Coles, their city rivals and defending champions, Thursday February 28, 41-40 in an overtime period.

The intra-city match was one of the most thrilling contests ever witnessed. The players had difficulty in the fading moments as the crowd went storming on the floor. With seconds ticking, away Coles was out in front 38 to 37 when George Rupert fouled Billy Kazee. With the pressure on, Kazee missed the first of 2 foul shots but sank the second one to throw the game into a 38-38 tie.


In the overtime Coles went ahead 40-38 on a field goal by McPeek, but Kazee netted a fielder and tied the score again.




### OFFICERS ELECTED
