The contest was conducted on a point system and a school had to have between 850-1000 points to win a first place.


The divisions are based upon the number of people in the school and the way the paper is printed.

PRAYER GROUP AT COLES GROWING DAILY



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

THINKING OUT LOUD


Did you ever stop to think what it means to

 and your class may soon be admired by everyone.






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
It may be---Coles Latin students will present another T. V. show during Latin Week. . . . Watch the papers and bulletin board for further announcements.

In discussing good citizenship in our homeroom one morning, we happened upon the question, Why do we have so few really effective students today? I was rather surprised at the group's reaction to the problem. They really gave it some serious thought and consideration and I'd like to pass on to you their conclusions. Of course, I've worked them over a bit, and I'll admit to a little "side-line coaching", but the ideas expressed are those of the students who participated in the discussion.

The reason we have so few really good students is few of them really know how to study.

The first, and probably most important, thing is to acquire the habit of studying systematically. Doing one's work regularly, sticking with it until it is done, and not falling behind in it are the general guides for successful study.

The following methods, if practised, will improve the efficiency of most students:

1. First, have a definite time and place... the study hall, the library, or your own room at home.
2. Avoid loitering and loafing. Wasting time is the greatest enemy of good scholarship.
3. A good student devotes considerable time to his lessons. This time must be used in concentrated effort if it is to be effective, and all good students and all people with records of achievement put in many hours of hard work. There is no substitute for time if a person wishes to reach a high level of achievement.



The trees are tinted with pale green



of us, and they really are always busy because there are approximately 84,204 calls every day consisting of 81,000 local calls and 3,200 long distance calls.

Their work looks very, very complicated because of the many keys in the switchboard, and it isn't strange that the operators sometimes hit the wrong key which causes us to get a wrong number.

When you forget a number, be sure to look it up in the telephone directory because there are only two information operators. And did you know that there are only twenty-four local operators and nineteen long distance operators working at one time to take care of calls from the 11,505 telephones which we have in Ashland? This number, according to the survey made in December, includes 2,026 business telephones and 9,479 residential telephones.

The telephone company was started by a group of business men in Ashland and is now managed by Talmadge Fleming, with whom we had our interview. Mr. Fleming said that our General Telephone Company of Kentucky is a part of the General Telephone System which is the largest independent telephone system in the United States.
