Y.C. BEGINS REGULAR SCHEDULE TUESDAY


Many Coles Kids attended the opening of the Youth Center on Saturday afternoon and the dance after the Senior play Saturday night.

KOLES KID MAKES GOOD


Six years ago in the school year of 1945-1946 at Coles Junior High, a little ninth grade guy called "Jeep" thrilled Koles Kids by his spectacular basketball shooting. Recently in the Knoxville News-Sentinel in "Strange as it Seems" by Elsie Hix Jeep's picture with the following comment occurred: "While making his debut in 4 successive schools--'Jeep' Clark of Ashland, Kentucky was high scorer in every opening game of the season---In one game he scored 3 field goals in 20 seconds! Ashland Hi vs. Boyd Co. Hi, Ky. Feb. 25, 1949."

Another news item appeared in the Sunday News on March 30 which is reprinted below: "Eugene Warren (Jeep) Clark of Ashland, Kentucky, holds a unique distinction. While making his debut at four successive schools, he was the high scorer in the opening game of the basketball season at all four schools! The streak started in 1945 at Coles Junior High, continued at Ashland Senior High, Ashland Junior College and at Mississippi Southern College



HONOR SOCIETY




Mr. McCann is a former Koles Kid and an A. H. S. alumnus.




HOWELL TO BE ON Y.C. BOARD





These books and many more will be ready for you to check out today, April 7.


LIBRARY NOTES
