

BRONCS DOWN VINSON 19-0


Coach Thompson's hard practices showed up Thursday, September 13 as the Broncos, headed by the dazzling playing of Herbert Thompson, downed Vinson 19 to 0.

Coles' first score came within minutes of the kickoff. A series of nice drives by all members of the backfield and a 25 yard dash by quarterback Thompson put the ball on Vinson's seven yard line. Two plays later, half back Don Light drove through the line for the score. McPeek's try for the extra point was not good.

In the second quarter, Coles scored another touchdown when a Vinson player fumbled and Tommy Dallas recovered in the Vinson end zone.

In spite of hard rain throughout the second half, Herbert Thompson, aided by excellent blocking galloped about 35 yards through mud, puddles of water, and Vinson players to score the third touchdown near the end of the third quarter. Thompson then plunged through the line for the extra point.

Light and McPeek also play exceptionally well in the back field. Sparks, Woods, Forrest Newsome, and Tommy Dallas performed well on the line.


PUTNAM DEFEATS COLES 6-0



Putnam scored late in the fourth quarter to defeat Coles 6-0 at Putnam Stadium, Friday September 21. Putnam's only touchdown came in the last quarter when little Buddy Sexton scampered 70 yards through the line. Their try for extra point was no good.

Coles had two chances to score but failed both. The first came when Walter Stephens took the ball on a double reverse play on his own thirty and picked up 60 yards before he was caught. There was a penalty against Coles for off side, however, and Stephens' run did not count. Early in the second quarter, Bo Newsome of Coles intercepted a Putnam pass in Putnam territory and ran all the way to Putnam's five yard line, but still Coles couldn't score. They tried to go through the line twice and around the end and through the air, but every thing failed. Coles never threatened Putnam after that.

Larry Highley played exceptionally well for Putnam while Stephens, Dallas, Forrest Newsome, Wayne Thompson, and Herbert Thompson performed well for Coles.


Although Koles Kids weren't much "in the mood" after the Putnam game last Friday night, the party given by the cheerleaders was a great help in driving their "blues" away.

Miss Taylor



Roberta confesses she has a weakness for two things - - -horses and baseball! Surprised? I'll bet you thought she had a weakness for boys as most 12 year old girls do!


NEW TEACHER PARADE




