

PUTNAM DEFEATS COLES 7-0

The Putnam Buccaneers defeated Coach Paul Thompson's hard fighting Broncos 7-0 and retained possession of the coveted Anderson Trophy. The game which was played Thursday, October 23, at the Tomcat Stadium before an approximate 1500 fans, was sponsored by the Ashland Kiwanis Club.

At the halftime Joe Rupert, president of the Kiwanis Club, presented Ruth Green, the Kiwanis Bowl Queen, a bouquet of roses. Her five attendants were presented with corsages.

Coles kicked off and after returning the ball to the 38 yd. line, R. Clere then picked up a first down and B. Sexton went to the Coles 18. Dixon was thrown for a loss and Putnam was forced to kick. No scoring was done until early in the second quarter when B. Sexton passed to A. J. Sexton. Clere plunged over for the extra point. Coles was unable to score and Putnam led 7-0.

In the third quarter neither team was able to score and the score remained 7-0.

In the fourth period with only minutes remaining, D. Clay recovered Putnam's fumble. V. Conley's pass was intercepted by J. Dixon. Then D. Ratliff intercepted a pass on the Putnam 40. Forced to kick, George Rupert sent the ball deep into Putnam territory and W. Jones recovered on the 11 yd. line. D. McPeck then advanced it for 3 yds, but Coles lost the ball on a fumble as the game ended with the score remaining Putnam 7, Coles 0.

The officials were: Ernie Daniels, Homer Blanton, Marco Rudd, and Gene Harris.



BRONCS LOSE TO SOUTH POINT 12-0


South Point defeated Coles 12-0 on October 2 at Tomcat Stadium. W. Jones of Coles received the kick off and returned the ball to the 50 yd. line, but the Bronns failed to gain and were forced to kick. With only a few minutes gone in the first half South Point's halfback broke off right tackle and scampered for a touchdown. The extra point was no good and South Point led 6-0.

Again Coles failed to gain after the kickoff and G. Rupert attempting to kick, was thrown for a loss. Soon after taking over the ball, South Point's fullback broke through left tackle for a T. D. and a 12-0 lead. They failed to convert the extra point, however, as the half ended.

In the third and fourth quarters both teams failed to score. Although in the fourth quarter Coles got a break as the ball was centered over the receiver's head and the Broncos recovered on South Point's 8 yd. line. With about three minutes left to play, D. McPeck went to the 2 yd. line after one play had failed, but the Broncos passed on the fourth down and the pass was intercepted. South Point kept the ball the remainder of the game. The final score remained Coles 0, South Point 12.

The Dramatic Club, which is sponsored by Miss Delores Graber and Mrs. Kathryn Pennington, held its first meeting October 24 in room 3.


All eligible seventh, eighth, and ninth graders interested in taking part in plays are urged to attend the second meeting Friday afterschool.

Their first program will be for the December P. T. A. meeting.



The Builders' project for this year is to purchase lights for the front steps. Their immediate plans concern the Annual Thanksgiving Dinner which is to be given November 24.


BAND NOTES


Horace "Junior" Ward


When he finishes school, Junior wants to be a missionary like his parents. . . . and return to Brazil!

Since each of you should help in the selection of a good citizen, you must, if you are to be honest and sincere about it, do several things:



Will you think of one, or two more things you should do?



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
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

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
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
