## BOOK WEEK OBSERVED NOV. 15-21


Book Week, November 15-21, will be observed at Coles by an assembly program directed by the library assistants and a giant display of new books, table exhibits, and a poster contest.







Mr. McCann, who is taking Mr. Rice's place as sponsor of the Conservation Club, urges all boys interested in joining the club to see him.


## BUILDERS

## Patty Anderson



May God help those who love you and are responsible for you to keep after you long enough, often enough, and hard enough to keep you on the right road or bring you back if you stray!



Does it seem that someone is after you? Day in and day out, hour by hour, class by class, night after night are you bedeviled by some one being after you or prodding you with a pronged implement for everything you do or don't do? Are adults, especially parents and teachers POISON to you?

If so, maybe there is a reason!

In 1951 more than 1,000,000 boys and girls under 18 years of age came to the attention of the police for misbehavior. This was misbehavior that was worse than that usually handled by parents and teachers. During 1952, one out of 24 persons (this includes adults) was arrested for some violation of the law that was more serious than a traffic violation. During the first half of 1953 there were 2.5% more crimes committed than in the first half of 1952.

Just how does this concern you? It's quite possible that someone or even several people who have a great responsibility for your growth and development are deeply concerned about you and your future. That they feel that the stupendous cost of crime, more than \$15,000,000,000 annually is small compared to the cost in heartache and unhappiness that it causes. They may be anxious--too anxious it may seem to you--to guard and protect you from a share in these tremendous costs.


Why should anyone think that you might be one of the 24? That depends on you and on many things. If you have frequent temper tantrums, long periods of sullenness, persistently have a hostile feeling toward parents, teachers, and playmates, habitually use bad language, or have a marked dislike for school you are already on your way to be one out of the 24. ## PROGRESSIVE CLUB




Statistically Coles had four first downs, was penalized 15 yards, fumbled twice, and recovered two.



The Bible was read by Patty Anderson and Herman Rupert led the pledge to the flag.


