



 They did good----why can't we?



The dinner was prepared by mothers of the Builders and was planned by Mrs. Calvin Meek who was in charge.


Candy sales have recently been held on Saturdays at the Second National Bank by the Builders to take care of the cost of the dinner.

and that doesn't make them unhappy either!


## NINTH GRADERS SEE IVANHOE


Book Week was observed at Coles this year as follows:


The Library Staff presented an Assembly program.
