# CHRISTMAS THOUGHTS



## Y TEENS





3. Those who have been courteous and considerate.



He is a member of the Builders Club and takes an active part in all the club projects.


## Howard Humphreys

You'll also have the opportunity of hearing her again tomorrow night singing "Ave Maria" in the Latin Christmas pageant.


