Declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the Act of Congress passed June
7th 1832 -

State of Kentucky }
County of Campbell }

On this 20th day of August 1832 personally
appeared in open Court before the
Honorable John L. Budge Judge of the County
Circuit Court Meir sitting, John Canaday,
a resident of Camp County & State of Kentucky,
aged Sixty nine years who being first duly
sworn according to Law both on his oath
make the following Declaration in order
to obtain the benefit of the Act of
Congress passed June 7th 1832 -

That he entered the service of the United
States under the following named Officer
and served as herein stated, about the
first of September 1861 he said Capt
Charles Callaway's Company of militia who
belonged to Colo Callaway's Regiment
of Virginia militia. This was in Suffolk County
State of Virginia who march us through
Prince Edward County through Peters
burg crossing James River at Swans
Point then on through James Town
Williamsburg & on to General Washing-
ton's head quarters at York County
Virginia. was then transferred from Colo
Callaway to Colo ~~Smith's~~ ^{Smith's} Regiment
in General Slocum's Brigade -

• Served ~~being~~ during the Siege at Yorktown
town was at the seizure of Cornwallis
whole army at Yorktown & ~~then~~ as
discharged from the service & returned home
making a tour of near three months
& while at Yorktown captured Stephen
Loves. Entered in the Continental Troop of
horse commanded by Capt Washington
for three years & served seven or eight
months in said Troop & then served the
Service of the United States & returned to
Bedford County Virginia, my Residence and
there prevailed on me to take his place
which I did as a substitute for said Loves
upon a new enlistment, which was for
serving ~~this~~ ^{the} being the punishment
put on Loves for his Desertion he being
returned as a deserter, was compelled to serve
the whole war ~~this~~ ^{this} enlistment was
about the first of July 1782 at Camp
inland Old Fort Mifflin being the
headquarters, the Adjutant to which I then
belonged was commanded by Capt Freebeck
or, ~~belonging~~ ^{belonging} to the 1st Pennsylvania
said Regiment, served at that place
until about October following, then was
transferred to Capt Greubers & Capt Seades
Troop who was ^{on} their march to the South
to ~~join~~ ^{join} Capt Washington's Regiment of
horse was then taken sick & not being
able to march was then ~~discharged~~ ^{discharged} by
those ~~left~~ ^{left} to return home and
remain there until I recovered my health

then was to return to him any troop going
to the south or where ever Capt Washington
troop of horse could be found. Accordingly
in march following I left home on the
hunts of said Regiment & Marched to New
London Campbell County & was there
stayed by Capt Irish the Commandant
of the Garrison at that place & was by
him returned; as an Invalid. to the Garrison
City, & continued at that place, until near
Christmas following, then was honorably
discharged as a Soldier for the War by the
Said Capt Irish of the Continental line &
Commandant of said Garrison.

a pension or an Annuity Except the present
and he declares that his name is not on the
pension Roll of any agency in any State

personally appeared before me the undersigned
a Justice of the Peace for the County of
John Cannaday, who being duly sworn depose
eth and saith that by reason of old age
and the consequent loss of memory he cannot
swear positively as to the precise length of
his service, but according to the best of his
Recollection he served not less than the
periods mentioned below and in the following
grades, for the year 1781 I served as a
Substitute for Samuel Cato, a drafted
militiaman of Bedford County Virginia, three
months as before stated & for the year
1782 I served as a Regular Soldier as above
stated six months, and for the year 1783
I served twelve months as a Regular
Soldier as before stated Making in all
one year & nine months and for such
service I claim a pension. - & will avoid
the several Interrogatories prescribed by the War
Department (first Interrogatory) Answer
Born in King George County Virginia in
the year 1763 March 15th. Second Interrogatory
Answered, I have no record of my age
Seventh Interrogatory, Answered John Percy
& Jesse Coffey sworn & subscribed the oath
above - John Cannaday

& the said John Percy states the Character
for Veracity of the above named John Cann
is good & believes that he did serve as a Regu
lar Soldier as he states for he was his mes
mate in the service & believes he did serve
as he states in the militia sworn to & subscribed

Be it known that before me John M. Erwin a Justice of the peace in and for the County aforesaid personally appeared Robert Kanaday Esq. known to me to be a person of good repute, and a credible witness and being duly sworn deposes and says, that he is the son of John and Mary Kanaday, that his Father was a Pensioner of the United States at the rate of \$36.66 per annum and that he died on the 15th day of December 1836. that his name was inscribed on the Pension Roll, John Cannaday that to his knowledge, the same family connections spelled their names differently - some with C and others with K - that his Father was not a scribe sufficient to write his own name. though he always said that the proper spelling of his name was with K - -

This deponent further states that the register of births hereto attached by inspection, is the correct register of the births of his Parents Children is in the handwriting of John Kanaday his older Brother and was written more than thirty years ago, and has been in possession of the family ever since that time this deponent was born September 2nd 1791 - John. the person who wrote this register is not living

Dear Sir:

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, R.1654, based upon service in the Revolutionary War of John Cannaday. The surname is also shown as Konnady, Canaday, and Kanaday.

John Cannaday was born March 14, 1763, in King George County, Virginia. The names of his parents are not shown.

While a resident of Bedford County, Virginia, John Cannaday enlisted about September 1, 1781, served as private about three months in Captain Charles Callaway's company, Colonel Callaway's Virginia regiment, and was at the siege of Yorktown; enlisted at Cumberland Court House, Virginia July 1, 1782, served in Captain Kirkpatrick's company, Colonel Fobiger's Virginia regiment, until October 1782, after which he served in Captains Yarborough's and Dade's companies, ~~chronic~~ to join Colonel Washington's regiment of horse, became ill and received a furlough to return home; he remained at home until March 1783, when he went to rejoin Colonel Washington's regiment, marched to New London, Campbell County, (Virginia), where Captain Irish was commandant of the garrison at that place and where said captain detailed him as an invalid to do garrison duty, which duty he performed until about Christmas, (1783) when he was honorably discharged.

The soldier was allowed pension on his application executed August 20, 1832, at which time he was residing in Casey County, Kentucky. In 1836 he was living in Montgomery County, Illinois. He died December 15, 1836.

John Cannaday married March 26, 1787, in Campbell County, Virginia, Mary Shearer. At the time of their marriage they were both living in Campbell County, Virginia. Names of her parents and date and place of her birth are not shown.

In 1844, soldier's widow, Mary Cannaday, was aged eighty-three years and a resident of Montgomery County, Illinois.

The names of their children are shown as follow:

In 1836, one John Canaday, and One William I. Canaday were residing in Montgomery County, Illinois and stated they had known the soldier about twenty and about fifteen years respectively, their relationship not stated.

In 1844, Robert Kanaday (as he signed), son of John and Mary Canaday was living in Montgomery County, Illinois.
