

DEATHS.

MRS. PHILIP SPEED, of Louisville, is dead. She was a niece of the poet Keats and mother of John Gilmer Speed.

JOS. J. LANDRAM, well-known in this section, and a son of the late Wm. Landram, of Stanford, died in the Eastern Lunatic Asylum, at Lexington, last Friday. He leaves a wife, but no children.

Mrs. LAZZIE YEAGER, wife of John T. Yeager, of this vicinity, died on Saturday afternoon, the 8th inst., after a brief illness, from a complicated disease, in the 43d year of her age. She was the daughter of Silas N. Figg, of Lebanon, formerly of Danville. Her husband and three children survive her. The funeral services at New Providence Church were held on Sunday afternoon, conducted by the pastor and friend of the family, Eld. John L. Smith, and her remains were followed to our Cemetery by one of the largest processions that we have witnessed for some time. She was a most estimable lady, highly esteemed in her neighborhood and greatly beloved by all who knew her. Her death was peculiarly sad; but she was fully prepared for the change, and passed over the "dark river" full of the buoyant hope of a Christian whose faith was well-grounded.
