State of Kentucky, Mason County, Va

On this the 11th day of Feb'y 1833 personally appeared in open Court before the Justices of the County Court, now sitting William Peck, a Citizen and Resident of said County of Mason & State aforesaid, aged ~~thirty~~ ^{thirty} years, who being first duly sworn according to Law, both on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7. 1832 that he entered the service of the United States as a volunteer, in the County of Frederick, State of Virginia, under Capt. Margueris Calmer who commanded a Company in Col. M^r. Decks Regiment, in Genl. Stevens Brigade and served a tour of four months - that they disembarked at Perry's ferry on the Sharon dock river, from thence they marched to Fredericksburg, where they remained several days, fixing & repairing arms &c - from thence they marched to the main army under Genl. La Fayette, which they joined at the Mountain Hill - from thence they marched to Richmond thence to Messier's ferry - and thence to Williamsburg - and left the army at a place called the old Magazine - having received an order to ~~bring~~ provisions - which

was considered a discharge; the provisions being designed to take them home. - that he entered the service as a private on the 11. May 1781. and left the army on the 11. Sept afterwards -

In addition to the Officers above named he recollects that McClellan was the 1st Lieut of his Company, that Johnson Easton was his 2nd Lieut & that Jeremiah Redman was the Ensign - He also recollects that Capt John Bell & Capt Nathl Ashby commanded Companies in the same Regiment & Brigade

He also recollects that - Southall was ^{Private} Major - and Geo W. Beringer was ^{acting as adjutant or} a Major

He also recollects that Gen. Lawson commanded a Brigade, which was near his.

He also states that he was drafted on the 7. May 1782, under Capt Alexander Semple to serve a term of two months at Manchester, Virginia. That he served out the term at Manchester Barracks, and was released by a succeeding Capt. that he received no discharge - but certificates authorizing him to draw provisions which was a discharge -

He states that he was born in King George County Virginia on the 20 July 1764 - that he has a record of his age on the family bible of his father, not now in his possession - which was transferred to a Bible now in his possession

Madam:

I advise you from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 31301, it appears that William Peck was born February 30, 1764 in King George County, Virginia.

While residing in Frederick County, Virginia, he enlisted and served as a private with the Virginia Troops as follows-

From May 11, 1781 to September 11, 1781 in Captain Marquis Calmes' Company, Colonel William Darke's Regiment; from May 7, 1782, two months in Captain Alexander Simrall's Company.

He was allowed pension on his application executed February 11, 1833, at which time he was living in Mason County, Kentucky.

He died February 13, 1837, leaving a widow, whose name is not stated. There are no further data as to family.
